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ABSTRACT (Arial 11 font size, bold, all caps, left aligned)

Maximum 200 words, Arial11 font size, justified, single line spacing, including the summarized the aim, method, findings and conclusion of the study.

Keywords: Maximum 5 words, Arial 11 font size, justified, separated with commas.

1. INTRODUCTION (Arial, 12 font size, bold, left aligned)

Extended abstracts should be written shorter than the full text. Subtitles of the extended abstract should be composed from the sections of abstract and keywords, introduction, material and method, findings and argument, conclusion and suggestions. Extended abstracts can contain figures, tables an formulations.

It should be written Arial 12 font size, justified, single line spacing. A blank line should be placed between the paragraphs and these paragraphs should not be included indentation. It should be formed A4 page size with 2,5 cm wide from the right, left, top and bottom and not included syllable segmentation.

The extended abstracts should not exceed 3 pages including the references written between 1000 and 1500 words and pages should not be numbered.

Introduction section should be included current literature review, similar studies and the differences of the research from previous works.

2. FIRST DEGREE SUBTITLE

First degree titles should be written left aligned, all caps and bold. Extended abstract must be determined method and material clearly and if necessary it can be included subtitles. Other above-mentioned subsections can be built similarly.

2.1. Second Degree Subtitle

Second and third degree titles should be written left aligned, bold and with title case.

2.1.1. Third Degree Subtitle

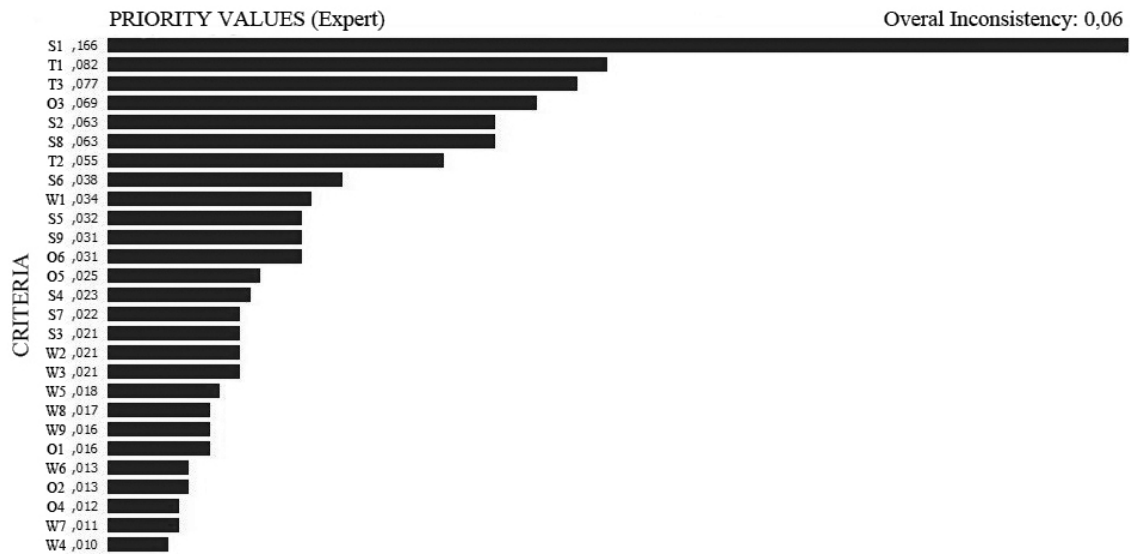


Figure 1. The priority ranking of experts (Demir et al., 2016)

All figures and tables should be centered. Figures (Figure 1) and tables (Table 1) should be numbered. The name of figures should be placed under the figure and the name of tables should be placed top of the table. Table, image and formulations headers should be written with bold and should be centered. If figures and tables have references, they should be presented with surname and date in parentheses (Demir et al.,2016; Demir and Demirel, 2016).
